Griffith's Valuation lists a Robert Caraher of Cormeen Glebe in the Parish of Drung – so this is likely one and the same person.

The 1901 Census has a John Carraher with his wife Elizabeth and family (two sons) living in Cormeen Glebe, then labelled as Larah South. The eldest son, aged 20, was called Robert, suggesting that John's father was most likely Robert Carraher (or Caraher). John was 48, his wife 40, Robert was 20 and Henry 16. Also living with them and their one servant was a niece: Anne L. Naye, aged 15. All were listed as Church of Ireland. The 24 year old servant, Andrew Smith, was a Roman Catholic.

They had gone by the 1911 Census.
